Taylor has practiced law since 1982. He serves as the County Attorney for Crockett County and is the City Attorney for Bells, Tennessee. Although he stays busy with his law practice, Taylor also serves on many boards and is very involved in his community.

Taylor is a member of the Crockett County Chamber of Commerce Education Task Force, the Crockett County Industrial Board, the Lions Club, the Crockett County Foster Care Review Board, Crockett County Chamber of Commerce Board, was the Chairman of the Scholarship Fund Drive in 1992, and the TAMB of Jackson. He has also served as the Executive Secretary of Alamo Dixie Youth Baseball League and the President of the Babe Ruth League, and was a member of the Alumni Council for the University of Tennessee College of Law from 1997 to 2000. Taylor is active in his church, serving as Chairman of Deacons, Sunday School Director, Brotherhood Director, and he has served on numerous committees in the church-finance, ministry and expansion.
